

### **Important Safeguards**

These safety instructions are to ensure the long life of your projector and to prevent fire and shock. Please read them carefully and heed all warnings.

### Installation

- 1. Do not point the projection beam toward other people or reflective objects.
- 2. Consult your distributor for information about transporting and installing the projector. Do not attempt to transport and install the projector yourself. The projector must be installed by qualified technicians in order to ensure proper operation and reduce the risk of bodily injury.
- 3. Place the projector on a flat, level surface in a dry area away from dust and moisture. Do not put the projector on its side when the Laser is on. Doing so may cause damage to the projector.
- 4. Do not place the projector in direct sunlight, near heaters or heat radiating appliances.
- 5. Exposure to direct sunlight, smoke or steam could

- harm internal components.
- 6. Handle your projector carefully. Dropping or jarring your projector could damage internal components.
- 7. To carry the projector, a minimum of six persons are required. Be sure to firmly grip the front and back handles, then move the projector.
- 8. Do not hold the lens part with your hand. Otherwise the projector may tumble or drop, causing personal injury.
- 9. Do not place heavy objects on top of the projector.
- 10. Turn off the projector, and disconnect the power cable before moving the projector.
  - For C2 connection, turn off the projector, shut down the AC power to the projector and the light using a circuitbreaker. Disconnect the cables between devices and the light before moving the projector.
- 11. Do not install and store the projector in the below circumstances. Failure to do so may cause of malfunction.
  - In powerful magnetic fields
  - In corrosive gas environment
  - Outdoors
- 12. If you need special installation work such as mounting on the ceiling or suspending from the ceiling using eye
  - Do not attempt to install the projector yourself.
  - The projector must be installed by qualified technicians in order to ensure proper operation and reduce the risk of bodily injury.
  - In addition, the ceiling must be strong enough to support the projector and the installation must be in accordance with any local building codes.
  - If you hang the projector from the high place such as the ceiling, use fall prevention wires (commercially available) to secure the lens unit in place. Failing to do so may result in the lens unit being loosened, causing it to fall.



### Do not do it

- 1. Do not use the projector with the supplied lens cap or equivalent while the projector is operating. This may cause the lens cap to heat up and deform or melt.
- 2. Do not place any objects, which are easily affected by heat, in front of the projector lens. Doing so could lead to the object melting from the heat that is emitted from the light output.



It is possible to vertically set up this device at 360 degrees. Do not use the projector with it leaning to the left and right. This may result in a malfunction, however, portrait installation is possible. Please read the warnings concerning portrait orientation before setting the projector in portrait orientation.





### **Power Supply**

1. Consult your distributor for installing the power cable to the projector. DO NOT install the power cable by yourself. Doing so may cause a fire or electric shock. The projector is so designed that it operates with the power supply voltage described below.

For C1 connection

(When the AC power to the projector power supply and the light power supply is provided by a single cable)

AC 200V-240V single phase 50/60Hz

For C2 connection

(When the AC power to the projector power supply and the light power supply is provided by separate cables)

- AC 200V-240V single phase 50/60Hz (projector power supply)
- AC 200V-240V single phase 50/60Hz (light power supply)

Ensure that your power supply fits this requirement before attempting to use your projector.

2. The power cable is not included with the projector. Ask your distributor for the power cable to select and purchase. Use a power cable that meets the standards and power supply voltage of the country where you are using the projector.

Refer to "2. Connecting the Power Cable" (page E-17)

for details on connecting the power cable.

- 3. Handle the power cable carefully. A damaged or frayed power cable can cause electric shock or fire.
  - Do not bend or tug the power cable excessively.
  - Do not place the power cable under the projector, or any heavy object.
  - Do not cover the power cable with other soft materials such as rugs.
  - Do not heat the power cable.
- 4. Placing the power cable and the signal cable closely to each other can cause beat noise. If this happens, keep the two separated so that beat noise is not generated.

Beat noise is corruption of the picture often seen as a rolling band moving through the image.

- 5. Do not touch the projector during a thunder storm. Doing so can cause electrical shock or fire.
- 6. When installed on the ceiling, install the breaker in a location that is easy to reach by hand.




### CAUTION

This equipment is designed to be used in the condition of the power cable connected to earth. If the power cable is not connected to the earth, it may cause electric shock. Please make sure the power cable is earthed properly.

### Fire and Shock Precautions

- 1. Ensure that there is sufficient ventilation and that vents are unobstructed to prevent potentially dangerous concentrations of ozone and the build-up of heat inside your projector. Allow at least 23.6 inches (60 cm) of space between your projector and a wall. In particular, clear a space of 27.6 inches (70 cm) or more in front of the air outlet on the rear surface and 11.8 inches (30 cm) or more on the upper part of the projecter body. ( $\rightarrow$  page  $\frac{E-13}{}$ )
- 2. Prevent foreign objects such as paper clips and bits of paper from falling into your projector. Do not attempt to retrieve any objects that might fall into your projector. Do not insert any metal objects such as a wire or screwdriver into your projector. If something should fall into your projector, shut down the AC power to the projector immediately and have the object removed by a qualified service person.
  - For C2 connection, turn off the projector, shut down the AC power to the projector and the light using a circuit breaker, and contact your dealer/distributor.
- 3. Turn off the projector, shut down AC power by using a circuit breaker and contact qualified service personnel under the following conditions. For C2 connection, turn off the projector, shut down the AC power to the projector and the light using a circuit breaker, and contact your dealer/distributor for a repair.
  - When the power cable or plug is damaged or frayed.

- If liquid has been spilled into the projector, or if it has been exposed to rain or water.
- If the projector does not operate normally when you follow the instructions described in this user's manual.
- If the projector has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged.
- If the projector exhibits a distinct change in performance, indicating a need for service.
- 4. When using a LAN cable:
  - For safety, do not connect to the connector for peripheral device wiring that might have excessive Voltage.
- Make sure to mount the power cable stopper before attempting to use your projector. Refer to page 00 about the power cable stopper.



### **Cleaning**

- Shut down AC power by using a circuit breaker before cleaning.
  - For C2 connection, turn off the projector, shut down the AC power to the projector and the light using a circuit breaker.
- 2. Clean the cabinet periodically with a cloth. If heavily soiled, use a mild detergent. Never use strong detergents or solvents such as alcohol or thinner.
- 3. Use a blower or lens paper to clean the lens, and be careful not to scratch or mar the lens.
- 4. Do not handle the projector and the power cable with wet hands. Doing so can cause electrical shock or fire.
- Do not use a spray containing flammable gas to remove dust attached to the lens and cabinet. Doing so may result in fires.

### Do not do it

- Do not shut down AC power to the projector under the following conditions. Doing so can damage the projector.
  - While projecting images
  - While cooling after the power is turned off.
- Do not turn off the AC power for 90 seconds after the Laser is turned on and while the POWER indicator is blinking green. Doing so could cause premature Laser failure.
- Keep hands away from the lens mounting portion while the lens shift is in operation. Failure to do so could result in fingers being pinched between the cabinet and lens cover.
- When main body is damaged, cooling fluids may come out of internal part. DO NOT touch and drink the cooling fluid.
  - When the cooling fluids are swallowed or contacted with your eyes, please consult with doctors immediately.

### Caution on Carrying the Projector/ Handling the Optional Lens

When installing / removing a lens, shut down the AC power to the projector.

When shipping the projector with the lens, remove the lens before shipping the projector. Always attach the dust cap to the lens whenever it is not mounted on the projector. The lens and the lens shift mechanism may encounter damage caused by improper handling during transportation.

### **Remote Control Precautions**

- · Handle the remote control carefully.
- If the remote control gets wet, wipe it dry immediately.
- · Avoid excessive heat and humidity.
- Do not short, heat, or take apart batteries.
- · Do not throw batteries into fire.
- If you will not be using the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries.
- Ensure that you have the batteries' polarity (+/-) aligned correctly.
- Do not use new and old batteries together, or use different types of batteries together.
- Dispose of used batteries according to your local regulations.

### Please heed all precaution for safety.

### To install the projector

- For planning the layout of the projector, make sure to take safety measures instructed on the installation manual.
- In order to refuse danger, install either a wall outlet within easy reach for pulling out the power plug in emergency or a device as a breaker to shut down the power supply to the projector.
- Take safety measures preventing human eyes from entering the RG3 area.
- Considering the installation place, select an appropriate lens and secure safety zone that is determined for each lens. For operation on the powered projector as light adjustment, make sure appropriate safety measures have been taken.
- Check the validity of taken security measures if appropriate safety zone based on the installed lens is secured. Periodically check the validity and keep these results.
- · Educate the administrator of the projector (operators) about safety before starting to operate the projector.

### To use the projector

- Instruct the administrator of the projector (operators) to perform inspections before powering on the projector. (Including the safety check against emitted light by the projector)
- Instruct the administrator of the projector (operators) to be in circumstances able to control the projector whenever the projector is powered on for an emergency.
- Instruct the administrator of the projector (operators) to keep the installation manual, user's manual and inspection records to a place where they can take these documents out easily.
- Instruct them to clarify if the projector is conformed to standards of each country and region.


### **Clearance for Installing the Projector**

Allow ample clearance between the projector and its surroundings as shown below.


The high temperature exhaust coming out of the device may be sucked into the device again.

Avoid installing the projector in a place where air movement from the HVAC is directed at the projector.

Heated air from the HVAC can be taken in by the projector's intake vent. If this happens, the temperature inside the projector will rise too high causing the over-temperature protector to automatically turn off the projectors power.



### **Example 1 - If there are walls on both sides of the projector.**





# 2 Introduction to the Projector

This section introduces you to your new projector and describes the features and controls.

### General

### Three-chips DLP projector with high resolution and high brightness

Realized to project the image in the resolution  $4096 \times 2160$  pixels (4K), the aspect ratio in 17:9, and the brightness in 35,000 lm (PH2601QL: 26,000 lm). Able to project 4K image in Native resolution.

### Superior dust prevention abilities

The projector utilizes a circular cooling system when cooling the optical components. It cycles cold air to replace the warm air inside the interior of the airtight case so open air does not touch the optical components. This protects against the device getting dirty with dust and dirt, as well as maintains brightness.

\* However, it cannot perfectly insulate against dust.

### · Running cost reduction by using a metal filter

With regular cleaning, the filter can be repeatedly used without replacement.

On top of reducing running costs, we have implemented this eco-friendly feature so there is no need to dispose of used filters.

### 4K element user logo images can be registered

4K element images can be registered and output as background logos in real 4K resolution.

### **Light source · Brightness**

### · Employs a long life laser light source

The projector employs a newly developed laser light source offering excellent reliability and redundancy. Since the laser light source has a long life (approx. 20,000 hours), this delivers low cost operation by removing the need for maintenance such as replacing and adjusting the light module over extended periods of time. Furthermore, it reduces the risk of the light source suddenly shutting off and leaving a black screen.

### Brightness can be adjusted within a wide range

Unlike with ordinary light sources, the brightness can be adjusted from 30\* to 100% in 1% increments.

\* PH2601QL: 40%

### • [CONSTANT BRIGHTNESS] mode

Brightness normally decreases with use, but by selecting [CONSTANT BRIGHTNESS] mode, sensors inside the projector detect and automatically adjust the output, thereby maintaining constant brightness throughout the life of the light module.

However, if brightness output is set at the maximum, brightness will decrease with use.

### Installation

### Wide range of optional lenses selectable according to the place of installation

This projector supports 7 types of optional lenses, providing a selection of lenses adapted to a variety of places of installation and projection methods. No lens is mounted at shipping from the factory. Contact your distributor for purchasing and replacing these optional lenses sold separately.

### Tilt-free, portrait projection

This projector can be set to any angle within a vertical 360° range.

It can also rotate the picture 90° into portrait orientation, however, it cannot be installed with right or left slant besides the portrait projection.

### Ceiling installation is easy

This unit can be suspended using eye bolts. It is easy to install because the structure not only allows it to be moved but also permanently mounted by suspending it from a ceiling.

When installing using eye bolts, have your distributor install the unit.

### Power lens control for quick and easy adjustment



- The power supply of the projector and the signal of the picture to project can be turned ON/OFF and switched here

- If you will not be using the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries.
- Ensure that you have the batteries' polarity (+/-) aligned correctly.
- Do not use new and old batteries together, or use different types of batteries together.
- Dispose of used batteries according to your local regulations.


### **Operating Range for Wireless Remote Control**



- The infrared signal operates by line-of-sight up to a distance of above meters and within a 60-degree angle of the remote sensor on the projector cabinet.
- The projector will not respond if there are objects between the remote control and the sensor, or if strong light falls on the sensor. Weak batteries will also prevent the remote control from properly operating the projector.

### **Using the Remote Control in Wired Operation**

Connect one end of the remote cable to the REMOTE terminal and the other end to the remote jack on the remote control.



### NOTE:

- When a remote cable is inserted into the REMOTE terminal, the remote control does not work for infrared wireless communication.
- Power will not be supplied to the remote control by the projector via the REMOTE jack. Battery is needed when the remote control is used in wired operation.
- When [HDBaseT] is selected in the [REMOTE SENSOR] and the projector is connected to a commercially-available transmission device that supports HDBaseT, remote control operations in infra-red cannot be carried out if transmission of remote control signals has been set up in the transmission device. However, remote control using infrared rays can be carried out when the power supply of the transmission device is switched off.

# **2** Connecting the Power Cable

Consult your distributor for installing the power cable to the projector.

If AC power is supplied to the projector and light with one power cable (C1 connection), it is not necessary to connect the cable to the projector power supply.

The power cable is not included with the projector. Use a power cable that meets the standards and power supply voltage of the country where you are using the projector. Ask your distributor for the power cable to select and purchase.




### WARNING

- Consult your distributor for installing the power cable to the projector. DO NOT install the power cable by yourself.
   Doing so may cause a fire or electric shock.
- Before connecting the power cables, check that the projector power switch and light power switch of the projector is turned off. Implement the connection with AC power shut off.
- Be sure to ground the equipment to ensure safety. Use a power cable that meets the standards and power supply voltage of the country where you are using the projector, and always connect the equipment to the ground. If the ground is not connected, it may cause electrical shocks.
- When connecting the power cable plugs to the AC IN and the electrical outlet, securely insert the plugs all the way in.
  - For C2 connection, be sure to install the power cable stopper.
  - If the connection between the power cable plug and the electrical outlet is loose, the plug area may generate heat, causing burns and accidents.

### 1. Connect the AC power supply cable.

Connect the AC power supply cable to the projector.



### 2. Connect the power plug to the electrical outlet.

This completes the connection of the AC power supply cable.

### Attaching the power cable stopper

To prevent the power cable from accidently removing from the AC IN of the projector, attach the supplied power cable stopper to clamp the power cable.




### CAUTION

- To prevent the power cable from coming loose, make sure that all the prongs of the power cable are fully inserted
  into the AC IN terminal of the projector before using the power cable stopper to fix the power cable. A loose
  contact of the power cable may cause a fire or electric shock.
- Do not bundle the power cable. Doing this could cause heat or a fire.

### NOTE


- Do not clamp the power cable with other cables. Doing so can generate noise, which can affect adversely the signal cable.
- · Be careful not to insert the band inversely. Once the band is attached, it cannot be removed from the slot.
- 1. Set the clamper band to the power cable side, and insert the end of band of the power cable stopper into the slot next to the AC IN on the terminal panel.

Attach the power cable stopper to the other side in the same way.



Pass each band through the slits in the power cable stopper.


Pass the bands through them so that the power cable will be sandwiched from above and below.



3. Slide the clamper to the hilt of the power cable.

Pulling the knob in the arrow direction allows you to adjust the clamper position.

Once the clamper position is adjusted, release the knob to lock the clamper.




### 4. Pull the band to hold the power cable.







#### NOTE:

- Turn off the projector power switch and light power switch to the projector when supplying or cutting AC power to the projector. Supplying or shutting down the AC power while the projector power switch and light power switch is on will damage the projector.
- Turning on and off the projector involves a two-step operation; the "projector power switch and light power switch" and the "POWER button" (POWER ON and OFF on the remote control).

#### **Performing Lens Calibration**

After installing the lens unit L4K-11ZM/L4K-15ZM/L4K-20ZM (sold separately), press the L-CALIB. button on the projector, or hold down the CTL button on the remote control then press the INFO/L-CALIB. button to carry out [LENS CALIBRATION].

- 4. Press the ▼ button four times to select [DEFAULT INPUT SELECT] and press the ENTER button.



The [DEFAULT INPUT SELECT] screen will be displayed.

- 5. Select a source as the default source, and press the ENTER button.
- 6. Press the EXIT button three times to close the menu.
- 7. Restart the projector.

The source you selected in step 5 will be projected.

NOTE: Even when [AUTO] is turned on, the [HDBaseT] will not be automatically selected. To set your network as the default source, select [HDBaseT].



When the projector is in Standby mode, applying a computer signal from a computer will power on the projector and simultaneously project the computer's image.

### Adjusting the Picture Size and Position

Use the lens shift dial, the level adjuster lever, the zoom lever/zoom ring and the focus ring to adjust the picture size and position.

In this chapter drawings and cables are omitted for clarity.



#### TIP:

Built-in test patterns can be conveniently used for adjusting the picture size and position. (→ page 76)
 A press of the TEST button will display the test pattern. The ◀ or ▶ button can select one test pattern. To close the test pattern, change the source to another.




- Perform the adjustment from behind or from the side of the projector. Adjusting from the front could expose your eyes to strong light which could injure them.
- Keep hands away from the lens mounting portion while the lens shift is in operation.
   Failure to do so could result in hands being pinched by the moving lens.

#### Adjustment of the projector's settings (Level adjusters)

The projector must be placed square to the screen otherwise keystone distortion may appear on the screen. For setting the projector perpendicular to the screen when viewed from the side, utilizing the level adjusters equipped at each corner of the projector bottom. Maximum Adjustable length of the level adjuster is 10 mm/0.39".

#### **Example for adjustment**



#### NOTE:

- Do not lengthen each of the level adjusters any more than 10 mm/0.39". The force of doing so may cause the level adjuster to come off, resulting in damage to the projector.
- Pay attention to lengthen or shorten two level adjusters at front at the same time. Same for the rear adjusters, otherwise, the
  weight of the projector is loaded on one level adjuster and it may cause of damage to it.

#### Adjusting the vertical position of a projected image (Lens shift)

NOTE:

• Shifting the lens to the maximum in two directions combined will cause the edges of the image to become dark or will cause some shadows.



5. Turn off the AC power to the projector.

#### 2. Projecting an Image (Basic Operation)

#### NOTE:

- In the following instances, do not turn off the projector power switch and light power switch or disconnect the AC power. Doing so can damage the projector.
  - While projecting images
  - · While the power is on
  - During the cooling after the power is turned off.
- After you have made the adjustments and closed the adjustment screen, do not turn off the projector power switch and light source power switch, or pull out the power plug from the wall outlet, or shut down the AC power supply for about 10 seconds. The adjustment values may be initialized if the AC power supply is shut down during this time.

Hold the CTL button and press the PIP/FREEZE button to freeze a picture. Press again to resume motion.



NOTE: The image is frozen but the original video is still playing ahead.

### Magnifying a Picture



#### TIP:

• Brightness normally decreases with use, but by selecting [CONSTANT BRIGHTNESS] mode, sensors inside the projector detect brightness and automatically adjust the output, thereby maintaining a constant brightness throughout the life of the light module. However, if output is already at its maximum, brightness will decrease with use.

### Preventing the Unauthorized Use of the Projector [SECURITY]

A keyword can be set for your projector using the Menu to avoid operation by an unauthorized user. When a keyword is set, turning on the projector will display the Keyword input screen. Unless the correct keyword is entered, the projector cannot project an image.



### (1) Controlling the Projector by Using an HTTP Browser

#### **Overview**

Using the web browser on the computer, the HTTP server screen of the projector can be displayed to operate the projector.

#### Possible operations on the HTTP server screen

- Configure the settings required for connecting the projector to the network (wired LAN). (NETWORK SETTINGS)
- · Configure the email notification. (ALERT MAIL)
  - When the projector is connected to a network (wired LAN), notifications on various errors are sent to the email address that has been set up.
- Operate the projector.
  - Operations such power on/off of the projector, input terminal switchover, picture control, and lens control etc. can be carried out.
- Configure the [PJLink PASSWORD] and [AMX BEACON] etc.

#### To view the HTTP server screen

- Connect the projector to the computer with a LAN cable sold commercially.
   Connect the LAN cable to the LAN port or HDBaseT port of the projector. (→ page 11)
- 2. Select [SETUP] → [NETWORK SETTINGS] → [WIRED LAN] in the on-screen menu to configure the network settings. (→ page 124)
- 3. Start up the web browser on your computer and enter the address or URL in the input field.

Specify the address or URL as "http://<IP Address of Projector>/index.html".

The basic HTTP server screen will be displayed.

TIP: The factory setting IP address is [DHCP ON].

#### NOTE:

- To use the projector in a network, consult with your network administrator about network settings.
- The display's or button's response can be slowed down or operation may not be accepted depending the settings of your network. Should this happen, consult your network administrator. The projector may not respond if its buttons are repeatedly pressed in rapid intervals. Should this happen, wait a moment and repeat. If you still can't get any response, turn off and back on the projector
- If the PROJECTOR NETWORK SETTINGS screen does not appear in the web browser, press the Ctrl+F5 keys to refresh your web browser (or clear the cache).
- This projector uses "JavaScript" and "Cookies" and the browser should be set to accept these functions. The setting method will vary depending on the version of browser. Please refer to the help files and the other information provided in your software.

#### **Preparation before Use**

Connect the projector to a commercially available LAN cable before engaging in browser operations. ( $\rightarrow$  page 150) Operation with a browser that uses a proxy server may not be possible depending on the type of proxy server and the setting method. Although the type of proxy server will be a factor, it is possible that items that have actually been set will not be displayed depending on the effectiveness of the cache, and the contents set from the browser may not be reflected in operation. It is recommended that a proxy server not be used unless it is unavoidable.

#### Handling of the Address for Operation via a Browser

Regarding the actual address that is entered for the address or entered to the URL column when operation of the projector is via a browser, the host name can be used as it is when the host name corresponding to the IP address of the projector has been registered to the domain name server by a network administrator, or the host name corresponding to the IP address of the projector has been set in the "HOSTS" file of the computer being used.

Example 1: When the host name of the projector has been set to "pj.nec.co.jp", access is gained to the network setting by specifying





# ② Storing Changes for Lens Shift, Zoom, and Focus [LENS MEMORY]

This function serves to store the adjusted values when using the LENS SHIFT, ZOOM and FOCUS buttons of the projector. Adjusted values can be applied to the signal you selected. This will eliminate the need to adjust lens shift, focus, and zoom at the time of source selection. There are two ways to save adjusted values for lens shift, zoom, and focus.



#### NOTE:

• Be sure to carry out [LENS CALIBRATION] after installing the lens unit L4K-11ZM/L4K-15ZM/L4K-20ZM. If you need to replace the lens unit, contact your distributor and have them do it for you.

#### To store your adjusted values in [REF. LENS MEMORY]:

1. Press the MENU button.



The menu will be displayed.

2. Press the ▶ button to select [SETUP] and press the ENTER button.



3. Press the ▶ button to select [INSTALLATION(2)].



4. Press the ▼ button to select [REF. LENS MEMORY] and press the ENTER button.



The [REF. LENS MEMORY] screen will be displayed.

5. Make sure [PROFILE] is highlighted, then press the ENTER button.



The [PROFILE] selection screen appears.

6. Press the V/▲ buttons to select the [PROFILE] number, then press the ENTER button.



Return to the [REF. LENS MEMORY] settings screen.

7. Select [STORE] and press the ENTER button.



The confirmation screen will be displayed.

8. Press the ◀ button to select and [YES] and press the ENTER button.



Select a [PROFILE] number and save the adjusted [LENS SHIFT], [ZOOM], and [FOCUS] values to it.

#### 9. Press the MENU button.


The menu will be closed.

TIP:

• To store adjusted values for each input source, use the Lens Memory function. ( $\rightarrow$  page 97)

#### To call up your adjusted values from [REF. LENS MEMORY]:

1. Press the MENU button.




The menu will be displayed.

2. Press the ▶ button to select [SETUP] and press the ENTER button.




- 3. Press the ▶ button to select [INSTALLATION(2)].
- 4. Press the ▼ button to select [REF. LENS MEMORY] and press the ENTER button.



The [REF. LENS MEMORY] screen will be displayed.

5. Make sure [PROFILE] is highlighted, then press the ENTER button.



The [PROFILE] selection screen appears.

6. Press the V/▲ buttons to select the [PROFILE] number, then press the ENTER button.



Return to the [REF. LENS MEMORY] settings screen.

7. Select [MOVE] and press the ENTER button.



The lens will shift based on the adjusted values stored in the selected [PROFILE].

8. Press the ◀ button to select and [YES] and press the ENTER button.



The adjusted values will be applied to the current signal. .

9. Press the MENU button.

The menu will be closed.

TIP:

To call up the stored values from [LENS MEMORY]:

1. From the menu, select [ADJUST] → [LENS MEMORY] → [MOVE] and press the ENTER button.



The confirmation screen will be displayed.

2. Press the ◀ button to select and [YES] and press the ENTER button.

During projection, if the adjusted values for an input signal have been saved, the lens will shift. If not, the lens will shift according to the adjusted values stored in the selected [REF. LENS MEMORY] [PROFILE] number.

To automatically apply the stored values at the time of source selection:

1. From the menu, select [SETUP] → [REF. LENS MEMORY] → [LOAD BY SIGNAL] and press the ENTER button.



2. Press the ▼ button to select and [ON] and press the ENTER button.

This will move the lens automatically to the position at the time of source selection according to the adjusted values.



NOTE: The Lens Memory function may not produce a completely aligned image (due to tolerances in the lenses) using the adjusted values stored in the projector. After calling up and applying the stored values from the Lens Memory function, finely adjust the lens shift, zoom and focus to produce the best possible image.

## 4. Multi-Screen Projection

A high resolution video can be projected on an even bigger screen by combining multiple projectors on the left, right, top and bottom.

This projector is equipped with an "EDGE BLENDING Function" that makes the edges (boundaries) of the projection screen indistinguishable.


#### NOTE:

- For projector throw distances, refer to "Throw distance and screen size" on page 152.
- Before performing the Edge Blending function, place the projector in the correct position so that the image becomes square in the appropriate size, and then make optical adjustments (lens shift, focus, and zoom).
- Adjust the brightness of each projector using [REF. LIGHT ADJUST] under [LIGHT MODE]. In addition, use [REF. WHITE BALANCE] to adjust the [CONTRAST], [BRIGHTNESS] and [UNIFORMITY].

#### Before explaining use of the Edge Blending function


This section explains the case for "Example: Placing two projectors side by side". As shown, the projected image on the left is referred to as "Projector A" and the projected image on the right is referred to "Projector B". Unless otherwise specified hereinafter, the "projector" is used to mean both A and B.

#### **Example: Placing two projectors side by side**




#### Things to note when installing projectors

 Leave sufficient space on the left and right of the projector so that the intake and exhaust vents of the projector are not obstructed. When the intake and exhaust vents are obstructed, the temperature inside the projector will rise and this may result in a malfunction.



· Please do not pile up the projectors directly on top of one another when installing them. When the projectors are piled up on top of one another, they may fall down, resulting in damage and failure. The following installation is recommended when combining the installation of two projectors. Please leave sufficient space on the left and right of the projector.





#### WARNING

Please request the retail store for special installation services such as when mounting the projector to the ceiling or suspending from the ceiling using eye bolts. Never carry out the installation by yourself. The projector may fall down and result in injury. Please use a sturdy cabinet that can withstand the weight of the projector for the installation. Please do not pile up the projectors directly on top of one another.

#### NOTF:

For the range of the projection distance, please refer to the Appendix "Throw distance and screen size". (→ page 152)

#### Preparation:

- Turn on the projector and display a signal.
- When performing settings or adjustments using one remote control, enable the [CONTROL ID] for assigning ID to
  each projector so as not to activate the other projectors. (→ page 121)

#### Setting the overlap of projection screens

- 1) Enable [EDGE BLENDING].
- 1. Press the MENU button.

The menu will be displayed.

2. Select [DISPLAY] → [EDGE BLENDING].

The [EDGE BLENDING] screen will be displayed. Align the cursor with [MODE] and then press the ENTER button. The mode screen will be displayed.



3. Select [MODE]  $\rightarrow$  [ON] and press the ENTER button.



This enables the Edge Blending function. The following menu items are available: [MARKER], [TOP], [BOTTOM], [LEFT], [RIGHT], [BLEND CURVE], and [BLACK LEVEL]

4. Select [RIGHT] for Projector A and [LEFT] for Projector B.


Press the ENTER button.



The following items are available:

[CONTROL], [RANGE], and [POSITION]

#### 5. Select [CONTROL] $\rightarrow$ [ON] and press the ENTER button.




Each [TOP], [BOTTOM], [LEFT], [RIGHT], and [BLACK LEVEL] has its own [CONTROL], [MARKER], [RANGE], and [POSITION].

• For Projector A, set the [CONTROL] for the [TOP], [LEFT] and [BOTTOM] to [OFF]. Similarly for Projector B, set the [CONTROL] for the [TOP], [RIGHT] and [BOTTOM] to [OFF].

# ② Adjust [RANGE] and [POSITION] to determine an area of overlapped edges of images projected from each projector.


Turning on [MARKER] will display markers in magenta and green. The magenta marker is used for [RANGE] and green one for [POSITION].



\* The 2 screens are separated in the diagram for explanatory purposes.

#### 1 Adjust [RANGE].

Use the ◀ or ▶ button to adjust the overlapped area.




#### TIP:

Adjust to overlap one projector' marker with the other projector's marker.

#### 2 Adjust [POSITION].

Use the ◀ or ▶ button to align one edge with the other edge of overlapped images.



#### TIP:

- When displaying a signal with a different resolution, perform the Edge Blending function from the start.
- Setting of [MARKER] will not be saved and return to [OFF] when the projector is turned off.
- To display or hide the marker while the projector is running, turn on or off [MARKER] from the menu.

#### [BLEND CURVE]

Adjust the brightness of the overlapped section on the screens. According to the necessity, adjust the brightness of the overlapped section on the screens by the [BLEND CURVE] AND [BLACK LEVEL].

• Set the [MODE] to [ON] for selecting [BLEND CURVE] and [BLACK LEVEL].

#### Selecting an option for the [BLEND CURVE]

By controlling the graduation of the overlapped section on the screens, it makes the border on the projected screens inconspicuous. Select the optimal option among nine.

1. On the On-Screen Menu, move the cursor onto the [DISPLAY] → [EDGE BLENDING] → [BLEND CURVE] and then press the ENTER. The option setting screen for the [BREND CURVE] is displayed on.



2. Select one option among nine by ▲ or ▼.




#### **Black Level Adjustment**

This adjusts the black level of the overlapping area and the non-overlapping area of the multi-screen (EDGE BLENDING). Adjust the brightness level if you feel the difference is too large.

#### NOTE:

This function is enabled only when [MODE] is turned on.
Adjustable area varies depending on what combination of [TOP], [BOTTOM], [LEFT] and [RIGHT] are turned on.

#### Example: Adjusting the Black Level when placing two projectors side by side




1. Select [DISPLAY]  $\rightarrow$  [EDGE BLENDING]  $\rightarrow$  [BLACK LEVEL] and press the ENTER button.

The screen will switch to the black level adjustment screen.




#### 2. Use the ◀, ▶, ▼ or ▲ button to select an item and use the ◀ or ▶ to adjust the black level.

Do this for the other projector if necessary.




#### 9-segmented portions for Black Level adjustment

The black level of the center projector is adjusted as shown in the figure.



The black level of the lower left projector is adjusted as shown in the figure.




#### TIP:

- The number of black level division screens changes depending on the number of edge blending positions selected (top, bottom, right, left). In addition, when the top / bottom and left / right ends are selected, the corner division screen appears.
- The edge blending width is the width set in the range and the corner is formed by the intersecting area of the top / bottom ends or left / right ends.
- The [BLACK LEVEL] can be adjusted to make it brighter only.

## **1** Using the Menus

NOTE: The on-screen menu may not be displayed correctly while interlaced motion video image is projected.

1. Press the MENU button on the remote control or the projector cabinet to display the menu.



NOTE: The commands such as ENTER, EXIT, ▲▼, ◀▶ in the bottom show available buttons for your operation.

- Press the ◀▶ buttons on the remote control or the projector cabinet to display the submenu.
- 3. Press the ENTER button on the remote control or the projector cabinet to highlight the top item or the first tab.
- Use the ▲▼ buttons on the remote control or the projector cabinet to select the item you want to adjust or set.

You can use the ◀▶ buttons on the remote control or the projector cabinet to select the tab you want.

- 5. Press the ENTER button on the remote control or the projector cabinet to display the submenu window.
- Adjust the level or turn the selected item on or off by using the ▲▼◀▶ buttons on the remote control or the projector cabinet.

Changes are stored until adjusted again.


7. Repeat steps 2-6 to adjust an additional item, or press the EXIT button on the remote control or the projector cabinet to quit the menu display.

NOTE: When a menu or message is displayed, several lines of information may be lost, depending on the signal or settings.


8. Press the MENU button to close the menu.

To return to the previous menu, press the EXIT button.

This projects the video of the device connected to the HDMI 1 IN terminal.

#### HDMI2

This projects the video of the device connected to the HDMI 2 IN terminal.

#### DisplayPort1

This projects the video of the device connected to the DisplayPort1 IN terminal.

#### **DisplayPort2**

This projects the video of the device connected to the DisplayPort2 IN terminal.

#### **HDBaseT**

Projecting the HDBaseT signal.

#### SDI<sub>1</sub>

This projects the video of the device connected to the SDI1 IN terminal.

#### SDI2

This projects the video of the device connected to the SDI2 IN terminal.

This projects the video of the device connected to the SDI3 IN terminal.

#### SDI4

#### **Using the Entry List**

When screen settings are made or lens memory registration is conducted, the signal adjustments are automatically registered in the unit's signal list. The (adjustment values of) registered signals can be loaded from the Entry List whenever necessary.

However, only up to 100 patterns can be registered in the Entry List. When 100 patterns have been registered in the Entry List, an error message is then displayed and no additional patterns can be registered. You should thus delete (adjustment values of) signals that are no longer needed.







If you find distortion on the pattern, adjust the projector installation angle or correct distortion by pressing the Geometric. button on the remote. Recommend to perform the focus adjustment after leaving the projector under the state the TEST PATTERN has been projected for over 30 minutes. 

- The [DICOM SIM.] option is for training/reference only and should not be used for actual diagnosis.
- DICOM stands for Digital Imaging and Communications in Medicine. It is a standard developed by the American College of Radiology (ACR) and the National Electrical Manufacturers Association (NEMA).

The standard specifies how digital image data can be moved from system to system.

#### [GENERAL]

#### **Storing Your Customized Settings [REFERENCE]**

This function allows you to store your customized settings in [PRESET 1] to [PRESET 7].

First, select a base preset mode from [REFERENCE], then set [GAMMA SETTING] and [COLOR TEMPERATURE].

HIGH-BRIGHT...... Recommended for use in a brightly lit room.

PRESENTATION ..... Recommended for making a presentation using a PowerPoint file.

REC709...... Display colors conforming to the ITU-R BT.709 standard.

CINEMA ...... Display colors conforming to DCI-P3.

REC2020...... Display colors close to the ITU-R BT.2020 standard.

sRGB ...... Standard color values.

DICOM SIM. ...... Recommended for DICOM simulation format.

#### Adjusting the gradation of the picture [GAMMA SETTING]

Adjusts the gradation of the picture. With this, even dark areas can be reproduced vividly.

NOTE: This function is not available when [DICOM SIM.] is selected for [DETAIL SETTINGS].

#### Selecting Screen Size for DICOM SIM [SCREEN SIZE]

This function will perform gamma correction appropriate for the screen size.

LARGE ...... For screen size of 150"

NOTE: This function is available only when [DICOM SIM.] is selected for [DETAIL SETTINGS].

#### Adjusting Color Temperature [COLOR TEMPERATURE]

To re-adjust the brightness, first turn this setting OFF before making further adjustments.

#### [COLOR SETTING]

The color range (color reproduction range) of the projected image can be adjusted by inputting the red, green, blue and white color coordinates of the projection light using a chroma meter that can measure color coordinates. The specified color (target color: TCGD) can be reproduced by measuring the value of the native color (color without color compensation) and registering it in MCGD.

Leave the light source on for at least 15 minutes before performing the COLOR SETTING in order to stabilize the brightness.

First set the MCGD color coordinates using the chroma meter, then set the color coordinates you want to display as the TCGDs.

We recommend using a Konica Minolta CS-2000 or CS-2000A to measure the color range.

#### NOTE:

The color setting cannot be performed when [HIGH-BRIGHT] has been selected for [DETAIL SETTINGS].

#### [SETTING]

Enables/disables the color setting.

When enabled, MCGD and TCGD can be set.

#### [MCGD]

Enter the color coordinates of the projected image.

#### RED/GREEN/BLUE/WHITE

...... Set the color coordinates.

Setting procedure:

- 1. Select red and press the ENTER button to switch to the red test pattern display.
- 2. Measure the center of the test pattern screen with a chroma meter.

Sets the target color.

REFERENCE............ This displays the preset values (6 types) or the red, green, blue, cyan, magenta, yellow and white color coordinates of the previously set settings (USER 1 to 10) as reference for inputting the target values.

#### RED/GREEN/BLUE/CYAN/MAGENTA/YELLOW/WHITE

...... Set the gain and color coordinates.

 When red is selected and the ENTER button is pressed, the gain and color coordinate input screen is displayed.

Use the **◄**▶ buttons to move the cursor, the **▼**▲ buttons to change the values.

2. Press the ENTER button to return to the [TCGD] setting screen.

Next, use the same procedure to make the inputs for green, blue, cyan, magenta, yellow and white, and set the gain and color coordinates for all seven colors.

If [0] is input for each of cyan, magenta and yellow, the values are automatically calculated from the red, green and blue color coordinates, and these values are set.

SAVE....... Select where to save the RED/GREEN/BLUE/CYAN/MAGENTA/YELLOW/WHITE gain and color coordinates.

Ten different settings can be saved.

#### NOTE:

• If no location for saving the values is selected for [SAVE] (i.e. is [---] is displayed), the set values are reflected temporarily, but they cannot be loaded subsequently. Be sure to select a location for saving the values (USER1 to 10).

- The value of MCGD will change with the projection environment; therefore, when the setup location or illumination conditions change, the value should be measured again.

#### [VIDEO LEVEL]

Selection of the video signal level when connecting an external device to the HDMI 1 IN terminal, HDMI 2 IN terminal, DisplayPort1 IN terminal, DisplayPort2 IN terminal, and HDBaseT IN terminal of the projector.

AUT0	The video level is switched automatically based on the information from the device outputting the signal.
	Depending on the connected device, this setting may not be made properly. In this case, switch to [NORMAL] or [ENHANCED] from the menu and view with the optimum setting.
NORMAL	This disables the enhanced mode.
ENHANCED	. This improves the image's contrast, expressing the dark and light sections more dynamically.
SUPER WHITE	The video contrast is improved and the dark areas appear more dynamic.

#### **Using the Lens Memory Function [LENS MEMORY]**



This function serves to store the adjusted values for each input signal when using the LENS SHIFT, ZOOM and FO-CUS buttons of the projector. Adjusted values can be applied to the signal you selected. This will eliminate the need to adjust lens shift, focus, and zoom at the time of source selection.

STORE ...... Stores the current adjusted values in memory for each input signal.

MOVE ...... Applies the adjusted values to the current signal.

RESET...... Returns the adjusted values to the last condition.

LOAD BY SIGNAL .. When you switch signals the lens will shift to the adjusted values of lens shift, zoom, and focus.

FORCED MUTE ..... To turn off the image during lens shift, select [ON].

#### NOTE:

- Lens memory adjustments will be automatically registered the ENTRY LIST. These lens memory adjustments can be loaded from the ENTRY LIST. (→ page 83)
  - Note that performing [CUT] or [ALL DELETE] in the ENTRY LIST will delete lens memory adjustments as well as source adjustments. This deletion will not take effect until other adjustments is loaded.
- For storing each adjustment of lens shift, zoom and focus as common value for all input signal, store them as reference lens memory.

To store your adjusted values in [LENS MEMORY]:

- 1. Project the connected device signal you want to adjust.
- 2. Adjust the projecting image of position, size and focus by the L-SHIFT, ZOOM +/-, and FOCUS +/- buttons.
  - Adjustment can be performed by the remote control. Please refer to "2-5 Adjusting the Picture Size and Position" on page 20.
  - Slight adjustment by moving the projector position and by the tilt foot is not subject of [LENS MEMORY].
- 3. Move the cursor on [STORE] and press ENTER.



4. Move the cursor on [YES] and press ENTER.

To call up the adjusted values from [LENS MEMORY]:

1. From the menu, select [ADJUST] → [LENS MEMORY] → [MOVE] and press the ENTER button.



The confirmation screen will be displayed.

2. Press the ■ button to select and [YES] and press the ENTER button.

To automatically apply the adjusted values at the time of source selection:

1. From the menu, select [ADJUST] → [LENS MEMORY] → [LOAD BY SIGNAL] and press the ENTER button.



2. Press the ▼ button to select and [ON] and press the ENTER button.

This will move the lens automatically to the position at the time of source selection according to the adjusted values.



#### NOTE:

• The Lens Memory function may not produce a completely aligned image (due to tolerances in the lenses) using the adjusted values stored in the projector. After calling up and applying the adjusted values from the Lens Memory function, finely adjust the lens shift, zoom and focus to produce the best possible image.

# Menu Descriptions & Functions [DISPLAY] [EDGE BLENDING]



This adjusts the edges (boundaries) of the projection screen when projecting high resolution videos using a combination of several projectors in the up, down, left and right positions.

#### MODE

This enables or disables the EDGE BLENDING function.

When MODE is set to ON, the MARKER, TOP, BOTTOM, LEFT, RIGHT, BLACK LEVEL and BLEND CURVE settings can be adjusted.

#### **MARKER**

Set whether to display marker or not when adjusting the range and display position. When turned on, a magenta marker for adjusting the range adjustment and a green marker for adjusting the display position will be displayed.

#### TOP/BOTTOM/LEFT/RIGHT

This selects the EDGE BLENDING locations on the left, right, top and bottom on the screen. The following settings can be adjusted when an item is selected. ( $\rightarrow$  page 69)

CONTROL ...... Enable TOP, BOTTOM, LEFT and RIGHT functions.

RANGE..... Adjust the range (width) of the edge blending.

POSITION ...... Adjust the display position of the edge blending.

#### **BLEND CURVE**

Set brightness for the EDGE BLENDING sections. (→ page 71)

#### **BLACK LEVEL**

Adjust the black level of the edge blending section.

## [PICTURE SETTING]

This sets the division conditions for reducing or enlarging the image area and displaying it in the desired position or for projecting using a combination of several projectors.

MODE	OFF	Use the projector in a standalone state.
	ZOOM	This adjusts the position and width of the video area that you wish to divide. The edge blending width will also be automatically set to that width.

You can choose between two options for menu color: COLOR and MONOCHROME.

## Turning On / Off Source Display [INPUT DISPLAY]

This option turns on or off input name display such as HDMI1 to be displayed on the top right of the screen.

#### Turning messages on and off [MESSAGE DISPLAY]

This option selects whether or not to display projector messages at the bottom of the projected image. Even when "OFF" is selected, the security lock warning is displayed. The security lock warning turns off when the security lock is canceled.

## Turning ON/OFF Control ID [ID DISPLAY]

ID DISPLAY ............ This option turns on or off the ID number which is displayed when the ID SET button on the remote control is pressed. (→ page 121)

#### Selecting Menu Display Time [DISPLAY TIME]

This option allows you to select how long the projector waits after the last touch of a button to turn off the menu. The preset choices are [MANUAL], [AUTO 5 SEC], [AUTO 15 SEC], and [AUTO 45 SEC]. The [AUTO 45 SEC] is the factory preset.

#### Selecting Interval Time for Filter Message [FILTER MESSAGE]

This option allows you to select the time preference between displaying the message for cleaning the filters. Clean the filter when you get the message "PLEASE CLEAN FILTER." (→ page 142) Eight options are available: OFF, 100[H], 500[H], 1000[H], 2000[H], 10000[H], 2000[H], 2000[H] The default setting is [OFF].

NOTE: Your setting will not be affected even when [RESET] is done from the menu.

## [MENU(2)]



## [MENU ANGLE]

Select the direction for displaying the menu.

## [MENU POSITION]

Shift the menu displaying position. You can choose from 9 locations.

#### TIP

- The display position of the menu is saved even when the power supply of the projector is turned off.
- When you change the [MENU ANGLE], the display position of the menu returns to the original state when it was first shipped from the factory.
- Input terminal and message displaying position are not influenced by the [MENU POSITION].




## **Selecting Projector Orientation [ORIENTATION]**

This reorients your image for your type of projection. The options are: desktop front projection, ceiling rear projection, desktop rear projection, and ceiling front projection.

#### NOTE:

Please consult the distributor if you require special installation services e.g. when mounting the projector to a ceiling or suspending from the ceiling using eye bolts. Never install the projector on your own. This may result in the projector falling down and causing injury to people.



## Selecting Aspect Ratio and Position for Screen [SCREENTYPE]

Sets the aspect ratio of the projection screen.

FREE ...... The ratio of panel is selected. Select this when projecting 17:9 screen (4K).

4:3 SCREEN..... For a screen with a 4:3 aspect ratio

16:9 SCREEN...... For a screen with a 16:9 aspect ratio

16:10 SCREEN...... For a screen with a 16:10 aspect ratio

#### NOTE:

• After changing the screen type, check the setting of [ASPECT RATIO] in the menu. ( $\rightarrow$  page 92)

## Using the Wall Color Correction [WALL COLOR]



This function allows for quick adaptive color correction in applications where the screen material is not white.

NOTE: Selecting [WHITEBOARD] reduces light source brightness.

#### Selecting Fan Mode [FAN MODE]

Fan Mode is used to set the speed of the internal cooling fan.

AUTO The built-in fans automatically run at variable speed according to the detected temperature and atmospher	ic
pressure by the built-in sensor.	

HIGH...... The built-in fans run at high speed

LOW ...... The fan speed is decreased, reducing noise.

#### NOTE:

- Make sure the speed is set to [HIGH] when you are using this device continuously for several days.
- Set [FAN MODE] to [AUTO] when using the projector at altitudes approximately 5500 feet/1700 meters or higher.
- Using the projector at altitudes approximately 5500 feet/1700 meters or higher without setting to [AUTO] can cause the projector to overheat and the protector could shut down. If this happens, wait a couple minutes and turn on the projector.
- Internal parts may need to be replaced earlier in the following situations.
  - · When using this unit at a high altitude
  - · When the unit is used in a high temperature environment
  - When the unit is used with the fan mode set to [LOW]
- Your setting will not be affected even when [RESET] is done from the menu.
- Using the unit continuously with the fan mode set to [LOW] will reduce the service life of the light source.

The SHUTTER indicator flashes green while lens calibration is being performed.





 Make sure that the projector is in the standby condition with the POWER cable connected.
 The projector has a built-in clock. The clock will keep working for about a month after the main power is turned off. If the main power is not supplied to the projector for a month or more, it requires to set [DATE AND TIME SETTINGS] feature again.





- When the projector is turned on by using the program timer and if you want to turn off the projector, set the off-time or do it manually so as not to leave the projector on for a long period of time.

#### Activating the program timer

1. Select [ENABLE] on the [PROGRAM TIMER] screen and press the ENTER button.

The selection screen will be displayed.

2. Press the ▼ button to align the cursor with [ON] and then press the ENTER button.

Return to the [PROGRAM TIMER] screen.

#### **DATE AND TIME SETTINGS**



You can set the current time, month, date, and year.

NOTE: The projector has a built-in clock. The clock will keep working for about a month after the main power is turned off. If the main power is off for a month or more, the built-in clock will cease. If the built-in clock ceases, set the date and time again. The built-in clock will not cease while in the standby mode. In order to activate the built-in clock continuously even when the projector is not used. leave it in the standby state not plugging off the power cable.

TIME ZONE SETTINGS...... Select your time zone.

DATE AND TIME SETTINGS ...... Set your current date (MM/DD/YYYY) and time (HH:MM).

INTERNET TIME SERVER: If you place a check mark, the projector's built-in clock will be synchronized with an Internet time server in every 24 hours and at the time of projector's startup.

UPDATE: Synchronizes the projector's built-in clock immediately. The UPDATE button is not available unless the INTERNET TIME SERVER check box is turned on.

SUMMER TIME SETTINGS ...... If you place a check mark, the clock for daylight saving will be enabled.

## Disabling the Cabinet Buttons [CONTROL PANEL LOCK]

This option turns on or off the CONTROL PANEL LOCK function.

#### NOTE:

How to cancel the [CONTROL PANEL LOCK]
 When the [CONTROL PANEL LOCK] is set to [ON], press the KEY LOCK button on the cabinet for 1 second or longer to cancel the [CONTROL PANEL LOCK] setting.

#### TIP:

- When the [CONTROL PANEL LOCK] is turned on, a key lock icon [ ] will be displayed at the bottom right of the menu.
- This CONTROL PANEL LOCK does not affect the remote control functions.

## [NOTIFICATION SETTINGS]

This setting is to enable/disable the notification by the buzzer and rear LED (Light status indicator/System status indicator).

## **Enabling Security [SECURITY]**

Unless the correct keyword is entered, the projector cannot project an image. ( $\rightarrow$  page 41)

NOTE: Your setting will not be affected even when [RESET] is done from the menu.

#### Selecting Communication Speed [COMMUNICATION SPEED]

This feature sets the communication speed for the PC Control port (D-Sub 9P). Make sure to set the appropriate speed for the device to connect.

#### NOTE:

Your selected communication speed will not be affected even when [RESET] is done from the menu.

#### Setting ID to the Projector [CONTROL ID]

You can operate multiple projectors separately and independently with the single remote control that has the CONTROL ID function. If you assign the same ID to all the projectors, you can conveniently operate all the projectors together using the single remote control. To do so, you have to assign an ID number to each projector.

CONTROL ID NUMBER ...... Select a number from 1 to 254 you wish to assign to your projector.

## NOTE:

- When [ON] is selected for [CONTROL ID], the projector cannot be operated by using the remote control that does not support the CONTROL ID function. (In this case the buttons on the projector cabinet can be used.)
- Your setting will not be affected even when [RESET] is done from the menu.
- Pressing and holding the ENTER button on the projector cabinet for 10 seconds will display the menu for canceling the Control ID.

#### **Assigning or Changing the Control ID**

- 1. Turn on the projector.
- 2. Press the ID SET button on the remote control.

The CONTROL ID screen will be displayed.





If the projector can be operated with the current remote control ID, the [AC-TIVE] will be displayed. If the projector cannot be operated with the current remote control ID, the [INACTIVE] will be displayed. To operate the inactive projector, assign the control ID used for the projector by using the following procedure (Step 3).

Press one of numeric keypad buttons while pressing and holding the ID SET button on the remote control.

#### Example:

To assign "3", press the "3" button on the remote control.

No ID means that all the projectors can be operated together with a single remote control. To set "No ID", enter "000" or press the CLEAR button.



## **Turning On or Off Remote Sensor [REMOTE SENSOR]**

This option determines which remote sensor on the projector is enabled in wireless mode.

The options are: FRONT/BACK, FRONT, BACK, and HDBaseT\*.

## NOTE:

• The remote control of the projector will not be able to receive signals if the power supply of the HDBaseT transmission device connected to the projector is switched on when this has been set to "HDBaseT".

#### TIP:

• If the remote control system does not function when direct sunlight or strong illumination strikes the remote control sensor of the projector, change to other option.

#### [NETWORK SETTINGS]



#### Important:

- Consult with your network administrator about these settings.
- When using a wired LAN, connect the Ethernet cable (LAN cable) to the LAN port or HDBaseT port on the projector. (→ page 150)
- Please use a shielded twisted pair (STP) cable of Category 5e or higher for the LAN cable (sold commercially).

TIP: The network settings you make will not be affected even when [RESET] is done from the menu.

## Hints on How to Set Up LAN Connection

## To set up the projector for a LAN connection:

# 6. Connecting to Other Equipment

Below is an example of connections to external equipment.

No connection cables are included with this unit. Use the appropriate cables for the connections.



## 1) HDMI cable (not supplied)

- Use a certified High Speed HDMI® Cable or High Speed HDMI® Cable with Ethernet.
- When connecting the HDMI 1 IN or HDMI 2 IN connector of the projector to the Blu-ray player, the projector's video level can be made settings in accordance with the Blu-ray player's video level. In the menu select [ADJUST] → [VIDEO] → [VIDEO LEVEL] and make necessary settings.

## 2 DisplayPort cable (not supplied)

Use a certified DisplayPort cable.



## (3) BNC cable (not supplied)

- Use cables that are 5C-FB or higher (5C-FB, 7C-FB, etc.) or Belden 1694A or higher. In addition, use cables with a cable length 100m or less.
- The length of cables that can be used may differ, depending on the signal.

## (4) LAN cable (not supplied)

- Please use a shielded twisted pair (STP) cable of Category 5e or higher for the LAN cable (sold commercially).
- The HDBaseT port of the projector supports HDMI signals (HDCP) from transmission devices, control signals from external devices (serial, LAN) and remote control signals (IR commands).
- The maximum transmission distance over the LAN cable is 100 m. (the maximum distance is 70 m for a 4K signal)
- Please do not use other transmission equipment between the projector and transmission equipment. The picture
  quality may be degraded as a result.
- This projector is not guaranteed to work with all HDBaseT transmission devices sold commercially.

# Cleaning the Cabinet



#### WARNING

Please do not use a spray containing flammable gas to remove dust attached to the cabinet, etc. Doing so may
result in fires

Be sure to always check that the AC power supply of the projector is disconnected before carrying out maintenance of the projector.

- Wipe with a dry, soft cloth without nap.
  - When the cabinet is excessively dirty, wipe with cloth well wrung after being dampened with a neutral detergent diluted with water and then finish up with a dry cloth.
  - When you use a chemical dust cloth, follow the instructions in the manual attached to it.
- Do not use a solvent, such as thinner or benzene. The coating may deteriorate or peel off.
- When removing dust on the ventilation opening, suck it off using an adapter with a brush on a vacuum cleaner.
   Never allow the cleaner without an adapter to come into direct contact or use a nozzles adapter in cleaning.
- Clean the ventilation opening at regular intervals. Dust, if allowed to accumulate there, may cause heating inside, which leads to functional trouble. The interval, which can vary with the location of your projector, is about 100 hours.
- · Do not damage the cabinet by scratching it or allowing hard objects to hit it. This can scratch the projector.
- Consult your dealer/distributor about cleaning the inside of the projector.

#### NOTE

Do not allow insecticide or other volatile liquid to splash on the cabinet, lens or screen. Also, do not allow any rubber or plastic
object to remain in contact with the cabinet for a long time. The coating may deteriorate or peel off.

# **2** Cleaning the Lens

Clean the lens the same way as with camera lens (using a commercially available camera blower or cleaning paper for glasses). Take care not to damage the lens when cleaning.



## WARNING

- Do not look into the light source while the projector is ON. Strong light is emitted from the projector and visual
  impairment could result.
- Please do not use a spray containing flammable gas to remove dust attached to the lens, etc. Doing so may
  result in fires.



## **CAUTION**

Before cleaning the lens, first turn off the power, make sure the cooling fan has completely stopped, then turn
off the AC power. Make sure the unit has cooled down completely before cleaning the lens.

# Cleaning the Air Filters

Air filters are attached over the air inlet of the projector to prevent dust. The air filters should be cleaned periodically in order to maintain projector performance.



## WARNING

- Dust in air filters will hinder ventilation of the projector, lead to a rise of the internal temperature and can cause a fire or malfunction.
- Please do not use a spray containing flammable gas to remove dust attached to the filters, etc. Doing so may
  result in fires.




## CAUTION

Before cleaning the filter, first turn off the power, make sure the cooling fan has completely stopped, then turn
off the AC power. Make sure the unit has cooled down completely before cleaning the filter. Removing the filter
cover while the unit is running could result in burns or electric shock from contact with internal parts.

The unit uses a two layer metal-mesh filter installed behind the filter cover. With regular cleaning it can be used repeatedly.




1. Remove the front filter cover.




(1)Press the stopper button (2 places).



(2) Pull the top part of the air filter towards you. Once you have freed the upper half of the air filter, remove the filter by pulling it diagonally upwards.




3. Lift the air filter in the direction of the arrow and remove it.



## 4. Remove the air filters.


(1) Slide the upper air filter to the position shown below.



(2) Lift the upper air filter in the direction of the arrow and remove it.



(1) Carefully remove the dust from the filter covers as well as from both sides of all the filters.




(2) Remove the dust from the grates on the outside of the projector as well.


Be sure to also remove any dust stuck to the louver (blind with angled horizontal slats) with a vacuum cleaner.

#### NOTE

- Whenever you vacuum the filter, use the soft brush attachment to vacuum. This is to avoid damage to the filter.
- Do not wash the filter with water. Doing so can result in damage to the filter membrane and also cause clogging.



## 6. Put the various parts of the filter together and fit them inside the filter cover.




Coarse grade filter


## 7. Fix the filter inside the projector unit.

- Before turning on the power, make sure that all filter covers are in place. If they are not fitted properly dust could get inside
  the projector causing it to malfunction.
- · Reset air filter usage time after cleaning the filters.

## **Resetting the Air Filter Usage Time**

- 1. Turn on the power to the projector.
- 2. Select [SETUP]  $\rightarrow$  [RESET] and perform [CLEAR FILTER HOURS].

This completes resetting the air filter usage time.



If you install the projector vertically you can project screens from your computer and other sources in portrait orientation.


- Be sure to install the device with the side where the Connection terminals and Controls/Indicator Panel are located facing the top.




## Precautions during installation


- Do not simply set the projector vertically on the floor or on a table. The projector may fall over, resulting in injury, damage or malfunction. Also the intake vent may become blocked causing the unit's internal temperature to rise resulting in malfunction and risk of fire.
- For portrait installation the intake vents must be installed at the top and bottom. To ensure air flow to the bottom intake vent, a rack to support the unit is necessary. Please hire an installation service provider (for a fee) to make a custom portrait projection stand.
- When installed in portrait orientation the projector can be tilted forward or backward within a range of ± 10°. Tilting the projector forward or backward outside of this range, or tilting it to the left or to the right could cause it to malfunction.



- To ensure air flow, maintain 60 cm/23.6" of space between the intake vent and the installation surface.
  - (NOTE) In the figure to the right there is plenty of space behind, above, and on either side of the projector unit.



## 3 Changing the Background Logo (Virtual Remote Tool)

This will help you perform operations such as projector's power on or off and signal selection via a LAN connection. It is also used to send an image to the projector and register it as the logo data of the projector. After registering it, you can lock the logo to prevent it from changing.

### If there is no picture, or the picture is not displayed correctly.

Power on process for the projector and the PC.

Be sure to connect the projector and notebook PC while the projector is in standby mode and before turning on the power to the notebook PC.

In most cases the output signal from the notebook PC is not turned on unless connected to the projector before being powered up.

NOTE: You can check the horizontal frequency of the current signal in the projector's menu under Information. If it reads "0kHz", this means there is no signal being output from the computer. ( $\rightarrow$  page 134 or go to next step)

· Enabling the computer's external display.

Displaying an image on the notebook PC's screen does not necessarily mean it outputs a signal to the projector. When using a PC compatible laptop, a combination of function keys will enable/disable the external display. Usually, the combination of the "Fn" key along with one of the 12 function keys gets the external display to come on or off. For example, NEC laptops use Fn + F3, while Dell laptops use Fn + F8 key combinations to toggle through external display selections.

· Non-standard signal output from the computer

If the output signal from a notebook PC is not an industry standard, the projected image may not be displayed correctly. Should this happen, deactivate the notebook PC's LCD screen when the projector display is in use. Each notebook PC has a different way of deactivate/reactivate the local LCD screens as described in the previous step. Refer to your computer's documentation for detailed information.

· Image displayed is incorrect when using a Mac

When using a Mac with the projector, set the DIPswitch of the Mac adapter (not supplied with the projector) according to your resolution. After setting, restart your Mac for the changes to take affect.

For setting display modes other than those supported by your Mac and the projector, changing the DIP switch on a Mac adapter may bounce an image slightly or may display nothing. Should this happen, set the DIP switch to the 13" fixed mode and then restart your Mac. After that, restore the DIP switches to a displayable mode and then restart the Mac again.

NOTE: A Video Adapter cable manufactured by Apple Computer is needed for a MacBook which does not have a mini D-Sub 15-pin connector.

- Mirroring on a MacBook
  - \* When using the projector with a MacBook, output may not be set to 1920 x 1200 unless "mirroring" is off on your MacBook. Refer to owner's manual supplied with your Mac computer for mirroring.





### If the temperature protector is activated

If the projector's internal temperature rises abnormally, the light module turns off and the temperature indicator flashes. It may happen that the projector's temperature protector is simultaneously activated and the projector's power turns off. If this happens, do the following:

- Unplug the power cable from the power outlet.
- If using in a place where the surrounding temperature is high, move the projector to a different, cool place.
- If there is dust in the ventilation holes, clean. (→ page 146)
- Wait as such about 1 hour for the projector's internal temperature to lower.
